At Saturday's luncheon Sam Nally (KCSA Chairman in 1957) was awarded an Honorary Life Membership

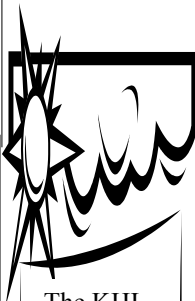
posthumously. Mark Nally shared his comments about his grandfather and accepted the award on behalf of the family.

MONUMENT TO HONOR VICTIMS OF TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS IS UNVEILED IN SLADE.

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet recently unveiled a stone memorial at the Slade Rest Area along the Bert T. Combs Mountain Parkway in Powell County to honor victims of highway traffic crashes. Governor Paul Patton and Kentucky Transportation Secretary James C. Codell, III participated in the ceremony and expressed sympathy to the families and pledged to continue to make safety on the roadways the number one priority.

This is the tenth monument erected to honor accident victims. The others are located in the state's eight welcome centers and in front of the Transportation Cabinet in Frankfort. Kentucky was the first state to erect permanent memorials for citizens who died on the roadways.

JAMES "MAC" YOWELL APPOINTED TRB LTPP COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP.

Congratulations to State Highway Engineer James "Mac" Yowell for being appointed to a 3-year term as a Member of the Transportation Research Board Long-Term Pavement Performance Committee (TRB LTPP). Mr. Yowell will play a key role in the development of the Committee's recommendations to the FHWA and AASHTO concerning the ongoing and future direction of LTPP.

KENTUCKY TRANSPORTATION CABINET SECRETARY CODELL HOSTS ENVIRONMENTAL WORKSHOP IN ARIZONA.

Secretary James C. Codell, III recently hosted a two-day workshop on Environmental Management Systems (EMS) at the American Association of State Highway and Transportation

Officials (AASHTO) Center for Environmental Excellence in Scottsdale, Arizona.

The goal of the workshop was to promote improved transportation program delivery and foster environmental stewardship through environmental management. Secretary Codell, AASHTO president, related to the group his own experience with environmental stewardship. "In Kentucky, we're changing an entire culture to make sure the environmental stewardship ethic is part of every single thing we do," said Codell. "Our policy calls for the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet to use practical means and measures to provide an environmentally sound, fiscally responsible, safe and efficient transportation system. This is taking place under conditions that help people and nature exist in productive harmony, while providing for economic growth and enhancing the quality of life, now and in the future.

The workshop is providing other state departments of transportation with a guide to developing their own EMS and how to apply it to transportation planning, design, construction and maintenance.

"I consider environmental leadership fundamental to getting our work done," Codell added. "Environmental leadership must be a first step in streamlining our environmental processes.

MSHA PROPOSES NEW RULES ON DPM EXPOSURE.

The U.S. Department of Labor's Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA) has issued a proposed rule addressing miners' exposure to diesel particulate matter (DPM) in underground metal and nonmetal mining operations. The agency also announced that public hearings on the proposal will be held in September to allow public comment on the rule. A notice of proposed rulemaking was published in the Federal Register on August 14.

"It's important that we get meaningful comments on the proposal so that we can

craft a final rule that will provide maximum protection for miners yet be responsive to mining industry concerns," said Dave D. Lauriski, assistant secretary of labor for mine safety and health. "The department's proposal will provide enhanced protection for miners from the effects of diesel particulate matter."

The proposed rule would change the interim diesel particulate matter (DPM) concentration limit to a comparable permissible exposure limit measured differently but considered to be more accurate. The proposal would also, among other actions, implement an enforcement strategy that is currently used at metal and nonmetal underground mines, and allow MSHA to consider economic as well as technological feasibility in determining if mine operators qualify for an extension of time in which to meet the DPM limits. The full text of the proposal can be found on MSHA's website at www.msha.gov.

MSHA also announced that it will conduct three public hearings to receive comments from the mining community on the proposed rule. Hearings are scheduled for Salt Lake City, Utah, on Sept. 16; St. Louis, Mo., on Sept. 18; and Pittsburgh, Penn., on Sept. 23.

MSHA is asking for comment on the proposed rule. Comments must be clearly identified as such and may be transmitted electronically to comments@msha.gov or by fax to 202-693-9441. LEGAL AND REGULATORY DEVELOPMENTS

► **Non-coal regulations aired at Administrative Regulations Review Subcommittee hearing.**

As part of the rulemaking process in Kentucky, the proposed new and amended non-coal mining amended-after-hearing regulations being promulgated by the Kentucky Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet ("KNREPC") were published after public hearing in the August 1, 2003 Administrative Register with a few minimal changes based on comments from the industry. Following publication, a hearing was held on the amended-after-hearing regulations by the Kentucky Legislature's Administrative Regulation Review Subcommittee ("ARRS") on August 7 at the Capitol Annex. Following the hearing, the ARRS voted unanimously to issue a letter of disapproval of the regulations in their entirety and requested that the KNREPC withdraw the regulations which the KNREPC declined to do. The letter of disapproval carries with it no direct legal effect, but it generally is a strong indication that the next Legislative session will consider possible legislation in connection with the disapproval. The next step in the process is the regulations must be referred by the Legislative Research Commission ("LRC") to an appropriate jurisdictional committee for a second review. It is expected that the LRC will refer the regulations to the Interim Joint Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources ("IJCANR") which is expected to consider the regulations at its meeting on September 10, 2003. This committee also has the option of issuing a letter of disapproval. The regulations become final at the adjournment of this second committee or 30 days after the assignment to the IJCANR if that committee fails to meet.

► **Activities in Other States Involving Non-coal Mining.** In Minnesota, the City of Waite Park

plans to test noise from an alleged controversial quarry to determine whether a conditional use permit is being violated. This move comes after residents complained about drilling sounds coming from Martin Marietta's Rainbow Quarry. City Council members voted to hire a neutral party to check the noise level. In a North Carolina legal dispute involving a quarry and several hundred disgruntled neighbors in Cross, North Carolina, a trial judge settled the five-year dispute growing out of blasting at the company's twin quarries. The judge ruled that the class-action settlement was "fair," paving the way for residents to start filing claims against the \$1 million the company agreed to pay over four years for such alleged problems as cracked driveways, shifting chimneys and rusty water at homes within a 5-mile radius. Some residents had been complaining for over a decade about water-removal activities and blasting. In a Texas court case, a Texas appeals court agreed with a quarry owner that it was entitled to the names and telephone numbers of participants in a survey which the homeowners' expert witness relied on in a nuisance lawsuit against the quarry. The court ruled that without the identities of the survey participants, the company would be unable to develop a record showing the inadequacy of the survey relied on by the homeowners' expert. Finally, the Supreme Court of New York ruled in a case in which a gravel and contracting company challenged the enactment of a local ordinance which prohibited new mining activities in the Town of Irwin, New York. The court held that the ordinance was invalid because the town had failed to adhere to its own notice requirements in enacting ordinances and because the company had already secured a permit at the time that the new ordinance proceedings had commenced.

► **Case pending in Federal Court in Kentucky on Whether the Estate of a Miner Killed in a mining accident is entitled to a jury trial against the mining company's parent company despite the workers compensation exclusive remedy provision in Kentucky.**

In an extremely important case to the mining industry as well as to employers in general, the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky has under consideration the issue of whether a parent of a mining company may be liable for civil damages to the estate of a miner fatally injured at a subsidiary's mine on the theory that the parent is independently liable because the parent provided "supplemental safety assistance" to the subsidiary from time-to-time. Such assistance apparently consisted of regularly reviewing the subsidiary's safety-performance data and encouraging the subsidiary in the organization and implementation of safety procedures. Should the plaintiff be successful in this litigation, this will open the door to numerous other lawsuits against parents of employers with similar practices, despite the workers compensation exclusive remedy provision contained in Kentucky law. The defendant, Arch Coal, Inc. has been joined by the Kentucky Coal Association, Kentucky Retail Federation, Kentucky Association of Highway Contractors, Associated General Contractors of Kentucky, Inc. and Associated Industries of Kentucky as amici curiae.

Oldham Chamber Bestows Award on Dynamic Duo Each had been told spouse was going to receive accolade

Barry and Bobbie Stoess don't often spend time trying to deceive each other. But when each one was told that the other had been named Oldham County Chamber of the Year-and to keep it a secret-the lies started.

"We basically spent the past couple weeks lying for each other," said a still-stunned Bobbie Stoess after the Oldham County Chamber of Commerce gave the annual award to more than one person for the first time. "We didn't know until that night that we'd both been honored. That was the best surprise of all."

The two had even gone so far as to help chamber officials prepare a recognition video played during the May 15 ceremony. It was a video that each thought would be centered on the other.

"We both helped on the video," Bobbie said. "And we never knew a thing."

Barry, 51 and Bobbie, 48 were honored through separate

nominations but for similar reasons. Barry, marketing manager for The Rogers Group, and Bobbie, a teacher for more than 24 years at Crestwood Elementary, have for decades given back to their community, friends and family said.

"He truly makes a difference in the lives of all who encounter his warm, caring and wonderful personality," said friend Mary Beth Westbrook of Crestwood. "The only person I can think of who is as deserving of this award is Barry's wife, Bobbie. Together they give and give and give back to our community."

Past recipients of the award made up the selection committee this year, and they apparently agreed with Westbrook.

They are active members of Crestwood Baptist Church, but it's Barry's years of volunteering with Boy Scouts and Bobbie's history with groups like Crestwood Kids, South Oldham Inter Church Council and the American Cancer Society that neighbors say have had the most impact on the community.

"One of Barry's greatest gifts is to the Boy Scouts," Westbrook said. "For many years he has helped with troops by being a leader, going on trips and working for senior citizens. He is a role model for young men throughout the community."

Barry is a past president of the Chamber of Commerce, past chairman of the Metro United Way in Oldham County and a past recipient of the Kentucky State United Way Award. Through his 25-year employment with Oldham County Stone Co./The Rogers Group, he has worked to ensure that the company gives building materials for community projects such as sports fields.

Bobbie has testified before the state House of Representatives on issues involving children's education. She is a former Crestwood Elementary Teacher of the Year and a recipient of Ashland Oil Inc.'s Golden Apple Award and the Ashland Oil Teacher Achievement Award. She serves as a Fifth District board member on the Kentucky
