## Officials Announce Plans For New Transportation Building

The design for the new Transportation Cabinet building, the largest state government-owned building to be constructed in Kentucky's capital in a quarter of a century was recently unveiled in Frankfort. Crit Luallen, secretary of Governor Paul Patton's executive cabinet joined Secretary John McCarty of the Finance and Administration Cabinet and Transportation Secretary James Codell, at the Kentucky History Center in Frankfort, to present renderings for the new facility, expected to be completed in fall 2003.

Construction of the 420,000 square foot building, which will be located in downtown Frankfort, will cost \$115.2 million including two adjacent parking garages that will hold about 1,500 vehicles. About ten percent of those will be

The new facility will move the majority of the Transportation Cabinet work force under one roof and will hold office space for about 1,325 people. When the location was announced in April, 1999, Governor Paul Patton said

the site was a key to continuing efforts to revitalize Kentucky's capital city and would be a boost to the downtown business district two blocks away. The Kentucky General

Assembly approved \$68 million for the facility in their 1998-1999 budget and \$19 million that was allocated for restoration of the State Office Building, where most of the cabinet is now located, was added for the construction. The 2000 legislature appropriated \$20 million for the parking

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garages. A separate utility building will support the new building and the State Office Building.

The state purchased property on Mero Street between St. Clair and High Streets at the foot of Fort Hill for the building and the first of two demolition phases on the site began last fall.

Ekhoff, Ochenkoski and Polk Architects of Lexington (EOP) were selected as the architects for the project in May. The firm was founded in 1981 and has completed projects in 30 states including designs for federal, state and local governments. Richard Polk is serving as the project principal for the new building. The firm has worked with Finance and Administration, Transportation, the Education, Arts and Humanities cabinets, the Kentucky Heritage Council, the University of Kentucky, local officials and Downtown Frankfort, Inc., in developing architectural guidelines for the facility.

**2001 ANNUAL LEGISLATIVE SESSION IN PROGRESS.** The organization session of the 2001 Annual Session occurred the first few days of January. The session will not reconvene until February 6 for the remaining 26 working days. Committees were announced during the organizational session.

Representative Rocky Adkins (D-99) was named the Chairman of the House Budget Review Committee on Transportation replacing the deceased Pete Worthington. In the Senate, several review committees were formed to parallel the House process. Senator Bob Leeper, (R-2) will chair the Senate Budget Review Committee on Transportation. Senator Virgil Moore and Representative Hubert Collins will continue to chair the respective Senate and House Transportation Committees.

Several bills have been filed that will require tracking during the legislative process when the session reconvenes on February 6. Bills have been filed relating to the phase out of property taxes on vehicles, a revision to Kentucky Workers' Compensation Laws, and a resolution has been filed to conduct a study on the weight distance and usage tax on motor carriers and replacement options.

**NAA-NSA NAMES ABOUT FACE, COMMUNITY RELATIONS, CAPSTONE, PATHEON AND "ROCKY" AWARDS WINNERS FOR 2000.** NAA-NSA recently announced the About Face, Community Relations, Capstone, Patheon and "Rocky" award winners for the year 2000. The honors

### ROGERS TO CHAIR TRANSPORTATION APPROPRIATIONS.

Rep. Harold Rogers (R-KY) will head the House Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee in the 107th Congress. Rogers replaces Rep. Frank Wolf (R-VA) who chaired the transportation spending panel for the past six years. Wolf and many other Republicans were forced to give up their committee gavels this year because of a rule adopted in 1994 limiting the number of terms committee chairmen could serve.

In a written statement, Rogers outlined his priorities for the next two years, including "properly funding and managing our 161,000-mile National Highway System, improving our air transportation system for the millions of passengers who fly each year, promoting safety on our nation's railways, and continuing the war on drugs with the resources of the coast Guard." The subcommittee approved a record \$58 billion for federal transportation programs this year, including more than a \$33 billion for road and bridge improvements. (*Am. Highway Users 1/12/01*)

**T**he following important developments summarized below occurred in the mine safety and health regulatory area since my last newsletter.

**M**SHA'S HEAD RESIGNS. J. Davitt McAteer, MSHA's most strident and aggressive leader, has resigned his post as head of MSHA following the presidential election and has been replaced temporarily by Robert A. Elam, a career MSHA employee. McAteer, who was a strong and formidable advocate of mine safety before and during his tenure as MSHA's leader, has taken a job on a federal review panel that considers appeals involving coal miner's black lung benefit claims.

**M**SHA ISSUES REGULATORY AGENDA FOR 2001. In issuing its regulatory agenda for 2001, MSHA listed a number of items that will have importance to the metal/nonmetal industry which are summarized below,

- \* **Metal/Nonmetal Impoundments - Proposed Rule** — MSHA intends to issue a proposed rule that will address proper design, construction and other safety issues relating to water, sediment and slurry impoundments for the metal and nonmetal mining and milling operations located throughout the country. Many of these impoundments are located within flood plains, new homes and near well-traveled roads.
- \* **Electrical Standards for Metal and Nonmetal Mines-Proposed Rule**— MSHA expects to propose a new

rule in April of 2001 to specify proper equipment grounding with respect to power mining equipment, transport material and for other purposes. MSHA believes that its accident statistics justify additional rulemaking to deal with inadequate or improper equipment grounding.

- \* **Safety Standards for Self-Contained Self-Rescue Devices in Coal and Metal and Nonmetal Underground Mines** — MSHA is considering proposing to apply SCSR standards to metal and nonmetal mines. SCSRs or self-contained self-rescuers are closed circuit breathing apparatuses that provide a source of oxygen in increasing miner's chances for survival during an irrespirable atmosphere. MSHA is considering a rule that would limit the service life of the devices, address the appropriate inspection for SCSRs and adequacy of training.
- \* **Surge and Storage Piles-Proposed Rule** — MSHA is considering rulemaking to expand the existing standard dealing with surge and storage piles to address vehicles and equipment. MSHA has documented a number of accidents involving miners operating vehicles on surge piles. The current standard only prohibits persons from walking or standing on or around surge or storage piles where hazards may exist.
- \* **Escape Ways and Refuges - Proposed Rule** — MSHA is considering a standard that would clarify and revise an existing standard that requires underground metal and nonmetal mines to have a least two separate exits to the surface.
- \* **Accident Investigation Hearing Procedures - Proposed Rule** — MSHA is considering a rule to clarify and codify accident investigation hearing procedures which would address all hearings convened by the Secretary of Labor to investigate any accident or other

occurrence relating to the health or safety of miners pursuant to Section 103(b) of the Federal Mine Safety and Health Act.

- \* **Diesel Particulate Matter (Exposure of underground metal and nonmetal miners) - Final Rule** — MSHA has proposed a rule for underground metal and nonmetal mines to establish a concentration limit for diesel particulate matter and to require the use of engineering and workpractice controls to reduce diesel particulate matter. MSHA believes its studies indicate that diesel exhaust presents potential health risks to workers and intends to finalize its rule in early 2001.
  - \* **Air Quality, Chemical Substances and Respiratory Protection Standards** — MSHA intends to propose revisions of the air quality rule in phases based on its assessment of priority needs. Its current regulations for exposure to hazardous airborne contaminants are over 25 years old and, in MSHA's view, do not adequately protect miners who are potentially exposed to various toxic chemicals and hazards. Examples cited are lead, cyanide, arsenic, benzene, asbestos and other hazards.
  - \* **Confined Spaces**—Storage bins, hoppers, tanks, stockpiles and other confined spaces at mining operations which present certain hazards including entrapment by shifting piles of loose materials, falling into materials and being struck by overhanging materials will be considered as a topic for regulation by MSHA during 2001.
  - \* **Training and Retraining of Miners** — MSHA's current regulations require all mine operators to have approved plans for
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training of their miners. MSHA is considering developing a proposed rule to reflect a more "flexible" approach in response to public comments, including increasing the number of hours of annual refresher training for supervisors from 8 to 12 hours and a broader type of training for supervisors than for miners.

- \* **Asbestos Exposure Limit** — MSHA's asbestos standard is 20 years old and MSHA believes that recent scientific data indicates that the agency's Permissible Exposure Limit ("PEL") could be more protective. In particular, MSHA is considering a rulemaking to lower the asbestos PEL.

**ON-LINE TRAINING PLANS REVISED BY MSHA.** MSHA has announced a new "on-line" method for filing Part 46 Training plans which is strictly optional. Operators can file Part 46 and Part 48 Training Plans by accessing the MSHA homepage and then choosing "Forms" and "On-Line Filings."

**MSHA ISSUES HAZARD COMMUNICATION RULES FOR MINES.** On October 3, 2000, MSHA issued interim final Hazard Communication ("HAZCOM") regulations that will be codified at 30 CFR Part 47 and that are intended to reduce injuries and illnesses related to chemicals in the mining industry. The rules require mine operators assess the hazards of the chemical they produce or use and to provide information to miners concerning the chemical hazards by means of a written chemical hazard communication program; labeling containers of hazardous chemicals; providing access to material safety data sheets and by training miners. A second comment on these rules closed on November 17, 2000.

*Since You Asked...*

The Division for Air Quality is in the process of promulgating new regulations for permitting. This is basically breaking down the old permitting regulation into new chapters by type of permit to be issued. One of the significant changes is for "state-origin" permits. The new regulation extends the life of the permit from five years to ten years. This could represent a savings to each company by not having to renew the permit as often as in the past. Of course, changes at the facility could require a new permit, just as it has in the past.

Most, if not all of the air permits issued for crushed stone operations require specific recordkeeping and reporting. This is the primary method for documenting compliance with the permit. Check the general conditions of your permit to determine if you are keeping the appropriate records.

All crushed stone operations are required to have and maintain certain environmental plans. These are called the Spill Prevention Control and Countermeasure (SPCC) Plan, the Best Management Practices (BMP) Plan, and the Groundwater Protection (GWP) Plan. These plans are required to be reviewed at least every three years and re-certified. Now would be the appropriate time to conduct this review.
